Creating a Catholic Home

The Mercantile's Products Are for the Generations

arrie Gress describes herself as the "least crafty person I know," so creating candles for her online store, The Mercantile, is an irony with the stamp of the Holy Spirit. It began with candles and has grown to include 20 products.

This wife, mother, author and speaker with a doctorate in philosophy chooses beautiful products that attract women to the heart of the home and deeper into the faith. Her two most recent coauthored books especially draw on the universal language of home as a place of nurturing and love: Theology of Home: Finding the Eternal in the Everyday and Theology of Home: The Spiritual Art of Homemaking (both available from EWTN Religious Catalogue).

When Gress created the Theology of Home online magazine, having a store was a way to support it. The idea of selling candles began after she received one as a gift as part of a fundraising effort to raise money for rescue dogs.

"It occurred to me that we [Catholics] have all those things in spades," she said.

"We have beautiful scents, we have a beautiful mission, and we have Our Lady."

She added, "People love candles. I looked at how we could pull this back in a way that draws us into prayer and also something very beautiful that can be a gift."

After contacting local candle makers and finding that no one could or would make the highquality soy candles with Our Lady's Star of the Sea logo she envisioned, she and her husband, Joe, began researching what it would take to make them.

"Joe does a lot of the mechanics and scientific stuff and pours the wax," Gress explained.

"I do the cleaning up and boxing and shipping."

The oldest four of their five children, who are 8 months and 6, 8, 9 and 11 years old, help out, making it a family business (and thereby indicating why they do not wholesale).

"We can't add a night shift." Gress said, explaining that Joe also works full time outside of the

Rome before having children, Gress was fascinated with quaint shops such as a 600-year-old apothecary shop that sold soaps and candles.

"I love to hear the history and story behind products; how people have kept the traditions alive and how they are using them to pass the faith down," Gress said.

By way of example, she referenced a sterling-silver rosary that had been her husband's greatgrandmother's and which gives her a sense of praying with the generations.

This generational outlook inspires her shop's offerings.

"We are looking at older things and how to put them in the marketplace so that they are contemporary and compelling," Gress explained.

Some new additions include charcuterie boards, travel candles, sterling rosaries, goat's milk soap and sacred art.

home.

The candles include "Guadalupe," with a rose foundation mixed with Mexican oranges, and "Baptism," inspired by the ancient chrism called the "holy anointing oil of God" used for the sacraments of baptism, confirmation and priestly ordinations. Gress recommends having the candles blessed so that they become sacramentals. As the website for The Mercantile, TOHMercantile.com, explains, "Few things transform a room like a lit candle, sparking light, warmth and life. There is a reason why even in our age of electricity, candles maintain an important place in our daily lives and worship. Stella Maris & Co. handpoured candles bring both of these elements together through the riches of Catholicism's two millennia of beautiful symbols, scents and sacramentals."

Customer responses confirm that Gress has found a niche for her products.

A 90-year-old customer who lights a candle for evening prayers told Gress, "I feel so much less lonely. The candle makes me feel like God is really present."

Another customer shared that she bought a candle for a relative who was very angry at the Church. "The next time she went to the relative's home, she was surprised to see the candle with an image of Mary behind it," Gress said. "Another customer who was struggling with infertility said the candle was a gift she could give at baptisms that didn't make her want to cry."

Gress' grandmother once asked Gress what she wanted to be when she grew up. "A customer," she said shyly. While she was living in Poland, France and

"All these things I'm working on fit together in a way I never anticipated," Gress said. "This is how you see the Holy Spirit coming out."

She said that even her doctorate in philosophy plays a role. "I realize the intellectual side is important, but I have also come to see how incarnational women are," Gress said. "We are also tactile and visual."

According to Gress, it's a matter of using her degree to think outside the box to reach women, using treasures to enrich one's faith by bringing the spiritual to the level of the material.

His bitterness gives way to curiosity and, then, compassion when a poor couple arrives and the young woman gives birth.

There is a quiet beauty to the rhyme of this story as well as its illustrations. The tale of the animals surrounds the gentle story of when Love came down to earth and was embraced ("Mary counts His tiny toes / and wraps the Child in swaddling clothes.") Ages 3-8.

Take Clement Moore's famous poem; keep the rhythm; stir in its touchstone phrases; change the narrator; situate it in Judea; and tell a new but ancient story. "Twas the very first Christmas, when all through the hills, / the towns of Judea were *perfectly* still," a young shepherd boy recalls; and, later, "When what to my wondering eyes should appear, a glorious angel sayillustrations accompany this upbeat, hope-filled tale. Ages 5-11.

This colorful board book introduces the birth of Jesus in the simplest, age-appropriate way for the

youngest of readers (or listeners!). On each sturdy page, a bold, bright picture with just a word or two will acquaint little ones with those who were there in Bethlehem. Readers will meet Mary, Joseph and Baby Jesus, along with angels, shepherds and kings. The stable, manger and animals also have a role to play. Ages baby to 3.

ABC Get to Know the Saints With Me! Written by **Caroline Perkins** Illustrated by Valerie Delgado EWTN Publishing, 2020 56 pages, \$17.95

This delightful alphabet book serves up the saints in a fun way. Saints who are well-known (for example, John Paul II) and lesser known (Xantippa) — as well as a saint just right for the Christmas season (Nicholas) - are introduced to young readers. The simple rhyming text ("Aa is for Anthony for when things are lost. / Bb is for Benedict fighting evil at all cost.") cheerfully draws kids'

Discovering (Secret) History

he team of Grzegorz Górny and Janusz Rosikon has done



Take the trial of Galileo, which is seen in a whole new light after St. John Paul II opened all the documents in the Vatican Secret Archives dealing with Galileo and his trial for clerical and secular scientific researchers to pore over. Much of the "legend" about his treatment has been debunked. These archives show Galileo, according to his own remembrances, was treated kindly by Pope Paul V. All he was asked to do was to present his findings at that point as a theory, not as proven fact, since he was unable to offer proof. He agreed but did not follow through. He did have disputes with people over this, but often due to his own hotheaded temperament. When he came to Rome for trial, he "took up residence in a five-room apartment, with a view of the Vatican Gardens and a servant at his disposal, all at the Holy See's expense," the authors relate. it again. They have followed in the footsteps of their last four books, including Fatima Mysteries and Witnesses to Mystery, about relics of Christ's passion and death, with another lavishly illustrated book, this time taking readers into the Vatican Secret Archives.

These archives are contained on shelves that, if lined end to end, would stretch 53 miles. Do all contain "secrets"? Well, no. In the official Latin words used, secretum means "private" or "personal," since the archives were meant for the use of the popes. This was not a lending library. But now that the archives are open, in a sense, they correct many misconceptions and downright lies fabricated against the Church - and believed — along the centuries.

Górny the writer and Rosikon the photographer uncover and help solve

CONTINUING PAGE B4 STORY three-year house arrest. Scholars and dignitaries visited him, and he could carry on his research and writings. He was not imprisoned.

"The second part of his punishment was a weekly recital of the Penitential Psalms for three years, which he continued later on his own free will," the authors write. "Nobody questioned Galileo's faith or his religious convictions, neither during the trial or before nor after; he stressed throughout his life that he was a faithful son of the Catholic Church."

The authors address both the Roman and Spanish Inquisitions, giving most of the chapter's weight to the former and making it clear the latter was state-run and totally unconnected to Rome. Górny and Rosikon recount how, after John Paul II had all the archives' 4,500 documents on the Inquisition released, the "secrets" revealed that secular authorities and public opinion caused the harm that was later blamed on the Church.

On the other hand, the duo tells readers, "The majority of the trials conducted by the inquisitors ended in acquittals, admonishments, or Church penances." In the worst area of rampant heresy, only 1% ended in death sentences. Surprisingly, it was the heretics and their methods that, in a sense, prompted St. Dominic to found a new order with a preaching



mission. He was given the Rosary by the Blessed Mother, which proved "to be extraordinarily effective during missions among the Cathars [a heretical group active in the 12th-14th centuries, which taught a form of dualism, the erroneous belief in two gods, one good and one evil]. Since then, it has been universally recognized in the Catholic Church that Mary is the best slayer of heresy, and the Rosary has become the mostused Catholic spiritual weapon."

The authors, who had access to the Vatican archives, also traveled to where some events occurred, meeting with experts who further shed light on the events chronicled in the archives, detailing here the Crusades and there the story of the Church doing missionary work in Mexico.

Regarding Our Lady of Guadalupe, readers see photos of the Nican

Rosikon's photos accompany other pictures, artwork, illustrations and documents brimming with interest and color — hundreds of them bring the history to life visually.

One poignant picture is of a monstrance, complete with golden rays, made of wood, cardboard and paper, and used by the chaplain to the insurgent Vendée army as the Catholics of the Vendée region were the target of genocide by the French Revolutionaries in the late 18th century. Overall, this book sets the histor-

ical record straight. Joseph Pronechen is a

Cross Catholic Outreach's Water Projects Provide Safe Options in Poor Communities

In recent years, water scarcity has been identified as one of the most critical problems poor families face in developing countries, and the Catholic missionaries serving in those nations have become more and more involved in the effort to find solutions.

While approaches to providing safe water have varied by location and situation, the concerted effort to save lives and restore hope has been a major success story for the Church. It should also be a source of pride for those who donated generously to fund the work.

"This has been an incredible mission to provide safe water. While some water is typically available in every area, the problem is contamination," explained Jim Cavnar, president of Cross Catholic Outreach, one of the leading Catholic charities involved in solving the water crisis. "For example, we're working on a major project in Nicaragua now [see story on opposite page] where people are getting sick because they have no other option but to collect water from shallow wells or rivers contaminated with human and animal waste, bacteria, and parasites. They use those terrible sources because they must have water to survive, but every time they drink or offer a cup to their children, they risk illness... even death."

According to Cavnar, infants and young children are at greatest risk of dying because their vomiting and bouts of diarrhea can lead to rapid dehydration, triggering serious medical issues. Fortunately, local clergy have become alert to these signs of trouble and have been quick to seek solutions.

"I remember one case where a visiting priest saw a child's coffin carried by a funeral procession. He spoke with local families and discovered it was one of many infant deaths they had experienced that year. When he discovered contaminated water was the cause, he contacted us for help, and with the support of our donors, we were able to address the problem and get clean, safe water flowing in the village again," Cavnar said. "In that case, the solution was to cap a nearby spring and pipe the water into the area. Everyone praised God for the lives that were saved."

The water project Cross Catholic Outreach is organizing in Nicaragua will be engineered differently, but Cavnar believes it will have the same dramatic impact.

"With the support of Catholic donors, we will use a professional rig to drill three 300-foot wells. It's the best way to ensure we hit an adequate supply of sweet water," Cavnar said. "Then, an electric pump will be installed. It will draw the water into a large holding tank with an added filtration system. The final stage of the project will involve the installation of PVC pipes to carry the water to nearby villages and a local school. The plan is to have water taps inside and outside the homes. With this plan, the families will have 24-hour access to safe water, and will get as much safe water as they need. There will also be water for gardens and crops."

Water projects like this have become extremely popular with Cross Catholic Outreach's donors, according to Cavnar.

"I think there are three things that appeal to them. They understand the importance of water and rightly view their contribution as a lifesaving gift. Second, they value the selfless efforts of our Catholic missionaries overseas and want to support their efforts. Last but not least, they know they have been blessed to have safe water at their own fingertips, and to thank God, they want to help others in need."

American Catholics Are Blessing the Poor in Developing Countries by Addressing Their Urgent Need for Safe Water

Before embarking on his long walk to school, 9-year-old Jahzeel Vega has a critical chore to undertake. He must take an old bucket to his family's hand-dug well and carefully lower it on a rope, hoping to collect enough water there for his family's daily needs. During the rainy season, he should be able to draw out three buckets full — enough for drinking and bathing that day — but during dry spells, he may not be that lucky. If the well is empty, another water source will need to be found, possibly much farther away. water. It makes them sick, but they drink it anyway because there is no alternative yet," explained Jim Cavnar, president of Cross Catholic Outreach, a respected Catholic ministry known for its programs to help the poor in developing countries. "You can imagine how that makes a mother like Francisca feel. Water is essential to her family's survival — but each time they drink, they risk getting sick."

In this case, Cavnar has learned, the shallow well may be particularly dangerous because it is located near Francisca Vega told them. She added that her neighbors in the village of La Danta Aserradores share her hardships and desperately want to find a solution to the water problem.

"We as parents have dreams for our children: to see that they have a better condition than ours," she said. "We want them to have better health, to enjoy a decent and dignified life."

Francisca's husband, Jairo, also suffers from a serious health problem — kidney failure — but his condition is caused by having too little water to drink. He and other field laborers can easily fall prey to dehydration while toiling under the scorching Nicaraguan sun.

"To alleviate his kidney problems, Jairo would need to drink more of the contaminated water, and that's obviously not a viable solution," Cavnar said. "No, the solution to all of these terrible hardships must involve outside intervention. The Church needs to get involved, and safe water needs to be made available to the poor. We and our U.S. donors are prepared to support that effort. If we all come together to solve this problem, Francisca's village can get the water system it needs to supply families with safe, abundant water. We need to ensure that happens."

To achieve a solution like this, Cross Catholic Outreach typically works with Catholic leaders already serving in the area. It is a cost-effective approach that allows more of a donor's gift to be used on the project itself, according to Cavnar.

"In this kind of partnership, the local mission's staff becomes our ground support team," he explained. "They organize local families to join in the work too, so we can usually keep the expenses on the project very low. Our intent is to use this approach to build a new water system for Francisca's village [see the related feature story above]. If we can get the help of Catholic donors in the U.S. to fund this effort, it will finally change the lives of the people in this Nicaraguan



community. Jahzeel Vega will be able to draw water from a convenient tap, his mother won't need to fear for her family's health, and his father will be able to recover from his illness because they will have an abundant source of water."

According to Cavnar, safe water is underground and ready to be tapped.

"This is our opportunity to bless the poor with a gift that will transform lives and have a lasting impact," he said.

As Jahzeel's mother, Francisca, watches the boy, she probably feels a sense of dread. That's because she knows something the boy does not. While the water he is drawing up is critical to the family, it is also unsafe. Unseen bacteria and parasites taint virtually all the water sources in this area, but the families living in Chinandega, Nicaragua, must drink what they can collect — *because they have no other choice*.

"Many of these Nicaraguan villages only have access to contaminated filthy latrines. These pit latrines leak pollutants into the water table. Animal waste, pesticides and even saltwater seeping in from the coast may also be a part of the problem. To learn how it might help, Cross Catholic Outreach's staff spoke to local families and local ministry leaders. They concluded the unsafe water is having a dire impact on youngest children, including Jahzeel Vega's 3-year-old sister, Emelyn.

"Emelyn has often been sick from drinking that water. She gets sick with vomiting, diarrhea and parasites,"
